▶ Painting / Art 20 / Triptych Painting







Triptych Painting Instructions:

- 1. Use the square view finder and select 9 interesting compositions. Spend time moving your view finder over the image area to find an area or element that is attractive to you. These images should:
 - a. Be a photograph
 - b. Focus on elements of art (rhythm, movement, balance, variety, emphasis—see handout for this assignment for examples)
- 2. Select your favourite 3 from the 9. These three should:
 - a. Work together to create an interesting and balanced arrangement
 - b. Contain an element that unites all three pieces together (pattern, movement, repetition etc).
 - c. Be the result of a rigorous searching of the best combination of all 9 squares
- **3.** When you have decided on your 3 squares, decide on the color scheme will work best.
- **4.** Sketch out your idea for the project by drawing 3 squares and recording the shapes as found in your favorite 3. Use color pencils to experiment with color layering.
- 5. Get approval of your final 3 squares before painting.
- 6. Once you have approval, get 3 canvas' from me.

- 7. Draw design lightly on canvas with pencil
- 8. Begin painting by using the complimentary color of the color you have chosen. Use thin washes of color for placement of shapes
- **9.** Paint background and light areas first. Start with light colors and build (it is easier paint dark colors over light colors). Allow undercoat of complimentary color to shine through in places: this allows for light and illumination.
- 10. Build your painting working from general to specific. Start by blocking in shapes and working back in with value and detail.

Color Scheme and Simultaneous Contrast Study Instructions:

You will create 4 mini abstract paintings. Each painting will feature one painting technique.

Painting Techniques:

Blending Impressionist Sky (transparency/opaque) Glazing

Sky (transparency/Opaque):

transitioning from fluffy clouds to blue sky

Blending

• transition slowly from one color to another or from one value to another

Impressionist

- laying down unmixed colors to give the effect of depth and light. Glazing
 - layers of subtle tones allow for slow transitions of value and color


Variety




Unity
